It is my great privilege to welcome you to the 2014 Conservatives Abroad Conference, being held in London for the fourth time. I am particularly pleased to be able to welcome, as in previous years, Conservative delegates from across the world. I am delighted that you are all able to attend.

No matter where you are based, there is much for Conservatives to take pride in. Four years ago our economy was in the danger-zone. Now, as we gather together in London, we have one of the fastest growing economies in the developed world. The deficit is down by more than a third, 25 million hardworking people have had their taxes cut; 1.8 million more people are in work; and net immigration has been cut by more than a quarter since the peak under the last government. If the Conservative Party wins the next General Election, we will remove the cap on the amount of time that British Citizens living abroad are entitled to register to vote in UK General Elections, giving everyone a full right to vote in British elections for life. I believe that being a British Citizen should give you the lifelong right to vote and I am so encouraged by Conservatives Abroad's support in this regard.

For this, and for so many reasons, we need to win the next election outright. So a huge 'thank you' for everything you have done, and continue to do, for our Party. Let's keep up the momentum and fight with every ounce of energy for a Conservative majority in 2015 – a majority that is within our grasp.

This comes with my very best wishes for an enjoyable and successful annual Conference.

Conservatives Abroad Chairman's Annual Report Heather Harper

In the run-up to the 2015 General Election, Conservatives Abroad has one overriding objective – to help return a majority Conservative Government.

To achieve this we have been working hard over the past year to create a clear strategy and put in place the organisational structures needed to deliver the highest possible level of Conservative votes from Britons living abroad.



In the 2010 General Election a total of just

32,729 British expats registered to vote. That's around 1% of the estimated 3 million eligible expat voters. Our task is to increase this number significantly in 2015.

To achieve this we have identified two clear programmes of work. The first is to remove the practical barriers that prevent people from registering and voting. The second is to engage and mobilise overseas voters.

1. Removing practical barriers

We have identified three practical barriers to voting – the 15 year rule; the process for voter registration; and the process for voting

The 15 year rule

Conservatives Abroad has been campaigning over many years to remove the rule that takes away the voting rights of Britons after they have lived abroad for 15 years. In 2012-13 we worked with Geoffrey Clifton-Brown MP and Lords Lexden and Norton to introduce amendments to the Electoral Registration and Administration Bill which would abolish the 15 year rule. The amendments were not supported by the Liberal Democrats or Labour and were not carried.

Subsequently Conservatives Abroad has been arguing the case for abolition within the Party and in September 2014 the Conservatives became the only party to commit to removing the 15 year rule if it is in government after 2015.

This is a major win for Conservatives Abroad and, although it will not allow long term expats to vote in 2015, it does give us a clear advantage when campaigning for expat votes. I am particularly grateful to our political advisor, Christopher Chantrey for his expertise in guiding us on this issue.

The process for voter registration

Conservatives Abroad has been working with the Electoral Commission to make it easier for expats to register. In 2014 the Commission introduced electronic registration so that you can now register online.



The process for voting

Since postal voting is most convenient for Britons living abroad we have been urging the Electoral Commission to ensure that the system works more effectively. In the past, the short period between issuing of postal ballot papers and election day meant that many postal votes were not received in time to be counted. Following additional pressure from Conservatives Abroad, the period between publishing postal votes and election day has been increased from 17 to 25 days.

Taken together these measures have ensured that it has never been easier to vote from overseas and the 15 year rule pledge will give the Conservative Party the best position to argue for the votes of Britons living abroad.

2. Engaging and mobilising overseas voters

We have identified three key areas of activity to enable us to engage with Conservatives living abroad, as members and potential voters. These activities are - to create the structures for communicating; encouraging and supporting branches; and engaging with expat voters.

Creating the structures for communicating

By the very nature of Conservatives Abroad, we need to be able to communicate regularly using the internet to reach our members and supporters worldwide.

We have therefore reviewed all our web-based tools and made the following improvements –

- Established a Mailchimp account to enable instant emailing to Conservative Abroad lists (chairmen, members, supporters). Our mailing lists now total over 3,000 addresses and I thank Philip Dumville, CA Membership Secretary, for his work in compiling these lists and his communications.

- Made the www.conservativesabroad.com website more active with news stories and regular updates as well as Electoral Commission downloads for voter registration.
- Made our Conservatives Abroad Facebook page more active with regular news stories. We now have almost 1,100 likes on our main Facebook page
- Encouraged branches to create their own Facebook pages. Six branches now run local Facebook pages
- Increased our twitter output
- Created a SurveyMonkey account to allow us to find out information from members
- Created an Everbrite account to allow us to promote events and sell tickets.

Taken together these provide us with the tools we need to communicate regularly and easily with our members and supporters.

We have also created a comprehensive list of expat media worldwide and developed good working relationships with relevant journalists in key UK national newspapers.

Encouraging and supporting branches

Branches play a really important role in engaging Conservatives throughout the world. Branch chairmen and representatives do a brilliant job, giving up their time and energy to support the Conservative Party and on behalf of the Party I would like to thank you all.



Conservatives Abroad now have over 60

branch chairmen or representatives worldwide and we're growing. 2013-14 has seen two new branches in Canada and very recently I launched a new branch in Ibiza with the help of Lindsay Hall the PPC for Westminster North. I visited CA members in Bahrain, Cape Town, Estepona, Tortola and several of the Branch Chairmen in London. I encourage all members to connect with other Conservatives Abroad when you or they are travelling - you are all so welcoming.

Conservative Abroad members have also been active in supporting our five adopted seats from the key 40/40 marginals (Mary Robinson in Cheadle, Douglas Hansen-Luke in Walsall North, Anna Soubry in Broxtowe, Flick Drummond in Portsmouth South and James Heappey in Wells) through telephone canvassing and fund raising.

Conservative Abroad branches will have a central role to play in encouraging conservatives to register and vote in 2015 in the campaign I am outlining below.

Engaging with expat voters

The centrepiece of our activity is a campaign to encourage Britons living abroad to register and then vote Conservative in 2015. Our new Head of Campaigns, Paul Barnes, has devised a professional campaign which has been approved by the Party Chairmen.

The campaign seeks to engage overseas voters to show them why they should vote in the general election, given that only 1% did so in 2010. The strategy is to create a flow of stories in media that expats read and watch which demonstrates the importance of them voting in 2015. We are also planning to target directly specific sectors of Britons living abroad.

To inform the campaign we have completed a survey of Conservatives Abroad members and others. This has identified the media you read and watch so we know which to work with for maximum effect. The survey has also highlighted issues of concern to Conservatives living abroad which will help us to campaign on issues that will interest them.

To front the campaign we have established a Conservative Backbench Group for the Rights of Britons Living Abroad jointly chaired by Geoffrey Clifton-Brown MP and Sir Roger Gale MP. Conservative MPs and peers have agreed to champion different elements of the campaign, supported by Conservatives Abroad.

The campaign will launch formally after Party Conference.

3. The Conservatives Abroad Team

In 2014, after many years of outstanding service for Conservatives Abroad, Lesley Taylor BEM retired and we will be eternally grateful for her hard work on which we are now building.

2014 has been a very difficult year for me personally, and I would like to thank everyone who has given me support in many different ways. Your letters and messages of sympathy have been of great comfort during this time, thank you.

Throughout the year I have been supported by a team of fantastic individuals who give their expertise and time freely and tirelessly. I would like to thank Christopher Chantrey OBE, Tristan Feunteun, Paul Barnes, Peter Freeman, Philip Dumville, Rula Al Adasani, Gaile Griffin-Peers and Jonathan Lytle.

I would also like to thank the International Office, led by Geoffrey Clifton-Brown MP and supported by Philippa Broom, Victoria Fryer and their team.

But most of all I would like to thank Conservatives Abroad members worldwide who give so much of their time and energy to the organisation. We are all volunteers for the Party and we work for the satisfaction of supporting our Party in whatever ways we can.

2015 will be a hugely important year for the Conservative Party. If we can mobilise just a fraction of the 3 million overseas voters we can make a big difference and help to return a majority Conservative government on May 5th. I am confident that we can meet this challenge.

Heather's early career was in advertising in London, producing TV commercials. She now works in the family solar energy business.

She is passionate about reforming the democratic voting rights of all Britons living overseas, recognising the 'unofficial ambassadors' who fly the flag for us overseas and securing a Conservative majority in 2015.





Lord Feldman of Elstree Co-Chairman of the Conservative Party

Andrew Feldman was created a life peer in 2010.

He has a degree in Jurisprudence from Brasenose College Oxford and subsequently went to the Inns of Court School of Law.

He was a management consultant with Bain & Co before being called to the bar in 1991. He worked as a commercial barrister until 1995. He subsequently joined his family fashion firm serving as Managing Director and then Chief Executive.

He was Conservative Deputy Treasurer and then Chief Executive of Conservative Campaign Headquarters playing a key role in the 2010 election campaign.

Following the 2010 general election the Prime Minister appointed him Co-Chairman of the Conservative Party.

Lord Feldman has been fundamental in supporting the growth of Conservatives Abroad.

After a degree in French and German at Oxford, Christopher has lived in France since 1973, where he has pursued a career in international marketing and advertising. gaining an MBA from INSEAD on the way.

Based in Paris, among other responsibilities in the British community, he served for five years as Chairman of British Conservatives in Paris, of which he is now President, and for three years as Chairman of the (non-political) expat representative body, the British Community Committee of France.

In both those organizations and in Conservatives Abroad, he has campaigned vigorously for several years for the abolition of the 15-year rule and for easier registration and voting systems for the British abroad.

Geoffrey has been a Member of Parliament since 1992, first for Cirencester and Tewkesbury then, following boundary changes, for The Cotswolds.

He is a Vice-Chairman of the Conservative Party and Chairman of the Party's International Office. He is also Chairman of the Conservatives Friends of the Chinese. In 1995 he was appointed PPS to the Agriculture Minister, Douglas Hogg. In opposition he held a number of front bench posts including that of Shadow Minister for Local and Devolved Government Affairs, Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs, Trade and Investment, Shadow Minister for International Trade and Development and a Whip.

He attended the Royal Agricultural College and is a chartered surveyor. He is managing director of a farming company.

Lynton Crosby

Lynton Crosby is the 2015 General Election Campaign Director for the Conservative Party.

He has a degree in economics from the University of Adelaide.

In the 1980s he advised the Liberal Party of Australia. From 1994 to 2002 he was first the Party's Deputy Federal Director and then Federal Director. He ran the successful General Election campaigns for former Australian Prime Minister, John Howard, in 1998 and 2001.

In 2002 he set up his consultancy firm which has since run over 250 campaigns in 57 countries.

In 2005 he managed the Conservative Party's General Election campaign when the Party won 33 seats, the first net gain from Labour since 1992. He subsequently ran both of Boris Johnson's successful mayoral campaigns in London in 2008 and 2012.



Rt. Hon. Dominic Grieve QC MP

Dominic Grieve has been the MP for Beaconsfield since 1997. He was the Attorney General for England and Wales and the Advocate General for Northern Ireland from 2010 to 2014.

He went to Magdalen College Oxford, where he studied Modern History. He was called to the Bar in 1980.

In 1999 he was appointed Conservative spokesman for Scotland and in 2001 he was appointed Conservative spokesman for criminal justice and community cohesion. From 2003 to 2009 he was Shadow Attorney General. In 2008 he was appointed Shadow Home Secretary and in 2009 he became the Shadow Secretary of State for Justice.

Dominic Grieve is currently president of the Franco-British Society, vice-chairman of the Franco-British Council and Honorary Recorder of the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames.





Rt. Hon. Greg Clark MP Minister of State, The Cabinet Office

Greg Clark is the Member of Parliament for Tunbridge Wells. His Ministerial responsibilities include constitution affairs.

Having studied economics at Cambridge University and earned his PhD at the London School of Economics, Greg joined the Boston Consulting Group, one of the world's leading business strategy firms.

He became Special Advisor to the Secretary of State for Trade and Industry, Ian Lang, from 1996-97 before joining the BBC as Controller, Commercial Policy.

From March 2001 he was Director of Policy for the Conservative Party before being elected to Parliament in 2005.

In May 2010, Greg was appointed Minister of State at the Department for Communities and Local Government and in July 2011 he was appointed Minister for Cities. In September 2012, Greg was appointed Financial Secretary to the Treasury before becoming Minister of State in the Cabinet Office in October 2013 and, latterly, Minister for Universities, Science & Cities in July 2014.

Syed Kamall MEP

Leader of the Conservatives in the European Parliament

Syed Kamall became Leader of the Conservative Party in the European Parliament in November 2013 having first been elected as a London MEP in 2005.

Syed studied Engineering at the University of Liverpool before earning an MSc from the London School of Economics and a PhD from City University, London.

He is a Visiting Fellow at Leeds University Business School where he has lectured MBA students in international business and strategy and supervised doctoral students' research. He has written a number of articles on the international strategies of firms and foreign investment.

Before entering the European Parliament, he worked as a consultant to companies on marketing, strategy and public affairs. In 2003, he started a diversity recruitment business.
